- Pictures are great additions to articles to create interest! If you include pictures, please send them as separate, clearly labeled documents. Include photo information and credits. Please do not format or embed them in any way.
- With the new merger of the newsletter and the Badger Bulletin, don't feel obligated to provide an article every month. If you do not have anything new to add for our membership, it's okay to go a while without an article.
- Articles must be submitted on time for each issue, which is the last day of the calendar month. Late

submissions will be inserted in the following month's newsletter.


- Proofread your article carefully for spelling and grammar before sending (use spellcheck or a software such as Grammarly). Advice: read your articles out loud to get a sense of tone.
- There is no need to put two or more spaces after periods for new sentences. That is an outdated method!
- Please name your filenames with your name, title, and newsletter month (e.g. Hopper, Joshua_Editor_ Jan24).

ON THE COVER:

In the year 1123 A.D. Pope Callixtus II officially canonized David of Wales a saint in the Catholic Church. St. David (c. 462–601) is believed to be the son of King Sant of South Wales and St. Non. As a monastic priest, St. David studied under St. Paulinus. Little is known about this saint outside of tradition, but what is known provides us with an exemplary example for how to live a balanced prayer life. St. David was believed to have been endowed with the natural qualities of a spiritual leader, leading many of the monasteries he worked with to flourish. His feast is celebrated on the date of his death around 589 A.D. (some accounts list it as 601 A.D.), which is March 1. He is the patron saint of Wales, vegetarians, and poets.

IN ROME, EVERY 25 years, the Church marks a jubilee. The jubilee was originally a practice deep in the old testament. The Hebrews would forgive old debts and right other wrongs. It was a time of rebuilding and restoration. Captives were set free. It was a time of returning the community to the glory that the Lord intended for it. In the Middle Ages, Rome christianized this practice, giving the Catholic Church a way to celebrate the renewal of God's grace flowing through the Church. The Church would open wide the treasuries of grace. The Catholic Church still does this today. This is represented symbolically with the opening of holy doors throughout the city of Rome. Passing through these doorways symbolizes leaving the older condition of your soul and entering the new graces that Christ

has for you in the Church in this time of jubilee. Local dioceses are encouraged to designate pilgrim sites for Catholics who wish to receive an indulgence. What is your diocese doing to mark the jubilee year 2025?

Traveling to Rome is an incredible experience and tremendous gift. Our faith is infinitely greater. Praise Jesus! He uses ordinary things like doors and church buildings and human hearts. He doesn't want anyone left behind. Who is someone who might be in danger of being left behind? Where is there a family in your community in need of greater freedom? As Knights of Columbus, are we just going to sit back and wait for people to find out about us? The KCs grew rapidly in the earliest day because men looked after each other. They knew which men were hurting and took steps to pray for them and their families. They were able to help protect families in their time of need. To do this today, we need a heart to see when people are spiritually in need, not just materially. The Knights that will successfully lead our order will continue to be men who build trust with men in the parish. Let's not be

in a hurry to move on to the next thing. You ARE your brothers keeper.

As Lent approches, ask Jesus to reveal to you someone that he want you to invest in spiritually. It needs to be someone you actually know. Make a commitment to pray for that person. Make a commitment to reach out and spend time with that man as a friend. Ask Jesus to reveal to you, "Who is a man in my parish, community, or even workplace who is in danger of being left behind?" Who is that one lost sheep that Jesus wants you to go after? Who is the captive Jesus wants to free? Jesus designed us and his Church to only work when we all enact the Good News in our lives. We are the messengers, and even the very voice and hands of Jesus. Leadership in the Church and of course the Knights is so much deeper than membership. It is how we recommit to our core values of fraternity, unity and charity in a personal way. How will you live this values and show them to someone in your sphere of influence?

"Instead, love your enemies and do good to them, and lend without any hope of return. You will have a great reward, and you will be children of the Most High, for he himself is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked..."

"Do not judge, and you will not be judged; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned; forgive and you will be forgiven..."

These excerpts serve as a nice reminder that as we begin the celebration of Lent on March 5, we should remember to not pass judgment on those around us.

AS OF FEBRUARY 24, we have assigned a total of 429 new Emembers since July 1. This is more than all of the prior Fraternal Year, and we still have 4 months to go. We are nearing 100 new E-members in a month. So far Councils have transferred 314 E-members into Councils this Fraternal Year. Roughly 50% of Council Intake this year has been through E-members.

The latest Online Membership statistics from Supreme show that Wisconsin has grown Online Membership 70.3% this year. This is the 4th best percentage increase in the order. Currently just over 30% of the Councils in Wisconsin have used Online Membership to bring new members into the order this year.

Cards with the QR Code to join online are available from Supreme. These can be very helpful when inviting men to join. Your Diocesan Membership Directors and District Deputies should be able to help you get these cards if you need them.

WGK & WFS please frequently review your councils **Prospect** tab and if you are having difficulty in making contact, or any other issue, please email me regarding these outstanding assigned e-members and I will gladly assist you with reaching a remedy.

Remember:

The **Prospect** tab shows you emembers that have joined your council online via the Supreme app. and the date field is used when they have completed their exemplification. **Prospect** tab training is available at this <u>link</u>.

Supreme presented a Webinar in December on Transferring online

members to council membership -The link for that webinar is <u>here</u>.

The **Candidate** tab is what you use when you recruit a member locally or are handling a member transfer request or a reinstatement of a prior member. The **Candidate** tab training covers new members and transfers into local councils. You may find it at this <u>link.</u>

Again, the date field is the date they were exemplified by your council. Once you enter those dates in either tab, the members will be automatically transferred to your council's roster within the next week.

Do not send Form 100's to Supreme for new members, keep them for your council's records. If you must use a Form 100, scan it and email it to Supreme. Keep the original for your Council Records.

If you have any questions or concerns, contact me. I am in your State Directory.

MARCH BRINGS US TO the our third quarter in 24/25 FY. I hope you have at least three of the four Community programs completed required for your Columbian Award and Star Council Award. If not, it's really time to get moving. Coats for Kids, Habitat for Humanity, Global Wheelchairs, Disaster Preparedness and Helping Hands are still very much in order this month! Knowledge and Free Throw Contests can still be done in March as you lead into the District Contests for Free Throw (March) and the Diocesan Contests for both (March/April).

Once again, the State Contest is set for Saturday, May 3, at Assumption High School in Wisconsin Rapids. Free Throw registration and practice will be 10-11 am with announcements at 11:15 am and competition starting shortly thereafter. For Math/ Spelling, it'll be a 10:15-11:15 am registration, announcements at

11:30 am, and the competition at 11:45 am.

The Culture of Life Essay Contest is wrapping up this month. Essays are due to the councils by March15. Winning council-level entries from each grade level (7-1) are due to the Diocesan Program Coordinators by March 31.

This month, I'd like to focus on the <u>Soccer</u> and <u>Hockey</u> Challenge competitions. The Hockey Challenge is relatively new. It can be run either outside or indoors, on ice skates, roller skates, or even in sneakers. So far, it has received very little interest in the state but we're always interested in assisting however we can any Council(s) who want to operate a contest.

Soccer, on the other hand, has a fairly large and solid base around the state. Before COVID, we had perhaps 20-25 Councils who were doing the Challenges and had regional contests in all 5 Dioceses, with a small State Contest as well (20-30 competitors) in the fall with the PPK contest. Since COVID, there have been hardly four or five Councils across the state reporting running the contest with no regionals or State Contest being held.

This is surprising given the number of kids playing soccer and the simplicity of operating the Challenge (easier than PPK). It can be done before or after school, during school (PE class), at sites of practices or games, day or night, indoors or outdoors, virtually anytime of the year. Councils can do it separately or join together with neighboring Councils or an entire District. Open to boys and girls, ages 9-14. You can recruit fellow Brothers, parents, parishioners, family parish or school staff, etc., to run it. Only a relative few are needed to successfully run an competition. We started out with a fall season (August-October). When that faltered, I advocated a spring timeframe (April-June). Now, I'm suggesting that the program can be done anytime from July-June! If we can once again get 15-20 Councils or more to run the program, we'll figure out how to get the Diocesan and State Contest structure going again! (In the past, we've even had several International-level champions!) So, let's make it a goal to revive the Soccer Challenge for 2025! Have a great March.
