

OUR ANNUAL STATE CONVENTION

will be held on May 16th – 18th at the KI Center in Green Bay. Part of being an active member is attending this important event. For months, our state team and host councils have been working hard in preparation for this convention, and its

success depends on your attendance. Therefore, I want to kindly urge you to consider registering, which can easily be done on our state website.

This opportunity allows your council delegates to have a voice in representing your membership by voting on new resolutions and electing the State Officers for the next fraternal year. In addition, I also urge you to consider Brother Knights from your diocese that would interested and able to attend the Supreme Convention in August in Washington DC.

INTAKE GOALS

In my March article, I mentioned that March is historically our strongest month for intake. We succeeded in bringing in 121 brothers in March, above our 2024 March average of 118 members. Thank you to all that made all this possible.

Additionally, as of April 14, we have welcomed a total of 888 men to our order, which is accounts for 74% of our state council's growth goal of 1206. With only three months remaining in this fraternal year, I need each member to help bring at least 318 more men to meet our goal. This can be as easy as walking up to an eligible and asking them to join. Many people we surveyed said they would consider joining our order but have never been formally asked. Now is the time to ask. If every council could step up and bring in just one new member, we will easily reach our 318 goal.

I am looking forward to meeting you at the convention to personally thank you for your efforts. Thank you brothers for all you do! *Vivat Jesus!*



AS I WRITE TO YOU, we are looking forward to another excellent KC convention at the KI Center in Green Bay. Bishop Ricken and the Green Bay Diocese always welcome us with warm hospitality. Have you books your spot at the convention this year?

Here in the month of May, we celebrate the month of Mary, the Blessed Virgin Mother of God. I am returning to Wisconsin just in time for convention after leading a pilgrimage to Knock in Ireland, and Medjugorje in Herzegovina. Both of these cities are places where Mary appeared to certain visionaries. On the evening of August 21, 1879, Mary appeared on the gable wall of the parish Church in Knock, along with St. Joseph, St. John the Beloved, and an image of the Lamb of God. There was no sound with the apparition, but it was witnessed by many parishioners until the apparition ended later in the night. The fruits of the apparition

were that many Irish were built up and consoled in their faith after so many years of hardship from the famine and oppression in that country. Incidentally, Fr. McGivney was still a young priest in New Haven, CT at the time of this apparition. Less than three years later, he would found the Knights of Columbus.

Medjugorje is a more recent example of Marian apparitions in the Church. On June 24, 1981, Mary appeared to five different teenagers in that city, drawing them all together to what is now called Apparition Hill. Mary continued appearing to each of them for many years subsequently. At least some of the visionaries continue to see Mary and speak with her even to this day. Because of the ongoing nature of these apparitions, the Church is not yet able to conclude and investigation to declare that these apparitions are "worthy of belief". In spite of this, the Church has been able to see for many years the great benefit to so many pilgrims who travel there. Medjugorje has produced many conversions and vocations. Visitors describe a prevailing spirit of peace over the entire city. In fact, Mary has asked to be known as "Queen of Peace" in Medjugorje. In recent years, the Vatican, under the guidance of Pope Francis, has stated that pilgrimages can officially be approved by the Catholic Church to Medjugorje.

On my pilgrimage, I will remember the Knights of Columbus of the state of Wisconsin in prayer. I pray that the KofC will be able to invest more in Medjugorje. Eastern Europe still needs peace to reign. I look forward to sharing the fruits of the pilgrimage with everyone at our annual convention in Green Bay.



Elections of New Council Officers

AS WE APPROACH OUR ANNUAL elections, it is important to reflect on the vital role leadership plays within our Knights of Columbus councils. A strong leadership team is essential for achieving our goals and fostering a sense of community, charity, and fraternity. With elections for council officer positions imminent, it is essential to communicate the process clearly and encourage active participation among our members.

The Importance of Council Leadership

Each officer position is critical in guiding the council's direction. The key roles available for election include:

- Grand Knight: The chief executive officer of the council who sets goals and presides over meetings.
- Deputy Grand Knight: Assists the Grand Knight and may take on program director responsibilities.
- > **Chancellor:** Focuses on membership growth, playing an essential role in recruitment and retention.
- > **Treasurer:** Manages the council's finances, ensuring transparency and fiscal health.
- > **Advocate:** Serves as the council's parliamentarian, knowledgeable in procedures and legal resources.
- > **Recorder:** Documents meetings to promote accountability and clarity.
- > Warden: Safeguards the council's property and oversees transactions.
- Inside/Outside Guards: Ensure smooth operations during meetings and assist with membership verification.

Election Process

To elect capable and dedicated officers, familiarize yourself with these essential steps to communicate with your respective council over the next two months.

Nominations and Campaigning: Encourage members to nominate candidates for each position

- over the next month. This period should allow potential candidates to express their visions for the council.
- > **Election Schedule:** Set a specific date for the elections, ideally at the end of the two-month timeframe. Notify all members to maximize participation.
- > **Voting Procedure:** Ensure a fair voting process on election day. Depending on your council's size, use either a secret ballot or a show of hands, and appoint a committee to oversee the process for transparency.
- > **Limitations and Qualifications:** Remind members of any qualifications for each position. For example, candidates for Grand Knight should have held another council office.
- > **Submission of Form 185:** After elections, submit Form 185 to the Supreme Council to officially report the newly elected officers and ensure proper record-keeping for a smooth transition.

Encouraging Participation

As Knights of Columbus, we know that unity and participation are our strengths. Make the upcoming elections a primary topic in meetings to generate interest. Encourage members to consider the commitment these roles require and remind them that serving in leadership is both a privilege and a duty to support our fraternity's growth.

In conclusion, as we prepare for this significant time in our council's calendar, let us honor the legacy of our organization by electing dedicated officers who are committed to serving our members and the communities we support. Let's move forward with enthusiasm and determination as we approach the upcoming elections!

A powerful resource to help streamline the effectiveness of our E-membership efforts is to utilize our calling cards. These calling cards contain a direct QR code link for online joining. Your dedicated Diocesan Membership Directors and District Deputies are your goto contacts for ordering these cards. They're always ready and willing to equip you with these cards to boost your recruitment efforts.

REMINDER

WGK & WFS please frequently review your councils **Prospect** tab. If you are having difficulty in making contact or if you have any other issue, please email me regarding these outstanding assigned e-members and I will gladly assist you with reaching a remedy.

Supreme presented a Webinar in December on transferring online members to council membership. If you need a refresher, you can watch it here. Again, the date field is the date they were exemplified by your council. Once you enter those dates in either tab, the members will be automatically transferred to your council's roster within the next week.

Do not send Form 100's to Supreme for new members, keep them for your council's records. If you must use a Form 100, Scan it and email it to Supreme, keep the original for your council records. Since Form 100's must be manually processed at Supreme, they can

PROSPECT TAB

The Prospect tab shows you e-members that have joined online via the Supreme app. and the date field is used to transfer them into your council when they have completed their exemplification. With Emembership, new members enter their own data, and then confirm their membership when they receive an e-mail from Supreme. These E-members are then part of the State Council, and get assigned to a local council. Until the local FS enters the Exemplification date, these members remain part of the State Council. Local councils get credit for them when the Exemplification date is entered by the FS to transfer them into your Council.

Clicking on this blue box will take you to the Prospect Tab training.

CANDIDATE TAB

The Candidate tab is what you use when you recruit a member locally or are handling a member transfer request or a reinstatement of a prior member. The Candidate tab can best be described as an online Form 100. The candidate tab training covers new members and transfers into local councils. Scan the QR Code for Candidate tab training.

Clicking on this red box will take you to the Candidate Tab training.

WE'RE IN THE HOME STRETCH of our Fraternal Year, and Wisconsin Knights are making impressive strides in membership! To truly reach our potential—a near 1,200 new members, the highest in almost ten years and a 20% increase—we need a final push.

I would like to encourage each council to host at least one exemplification in May or June. Imagine the collective impact! Together, this could easily bring in over 300 new brothers! This is also a prime opportunity to help our 1st Degree Knights advance, strengthening your council from within and potentially identifying those ready to take on leadership roles. Let's work together to make these final months our most impactful yet!

To invite and attract new members—I would encourage every council to review the following two opportunities and see if you can identify a handful of potential new members to reach out to:

- > **OCIA Candidates** that were just brought into the Church this past Easter
- High School Seniors or any student older than age 17.5 years old

Each of our councils represent a parish that has a Religious Education program and a local high school. Asking council members if their sons, grandsons, nephews, neighbors, etc. would now be of age and able to join the Knights can help us identify a number of individuals to invite into the Order. An easy way to do so would be to utilize the E-Membership process.

With over 500 members joining online year to date, and many of these men transferring into local councils, our councils have used the online process at a record pace this year. Continue to utilize this important feature these last two months to help grow your councils!

WE ARE NOW IN A PERIOD of where we continue to celebrate the Lord's resurrection in a period called Eastertide. Not only that, but the month May is dedicated to Mary, the Mother of God. I would like to encourage you to consider a consecration to Mary to help you grow deeper

in holiness and your relationship with Jesus.

Likewise, June is the month of Jesus and it calls us to focus more on Him, especially during this Eucharistic Revival. Your council has a wonderful opportunity to lead by sponsoring a Eucharistic Procession in your parish or town, or perhaps organizing a Holy Hour or the Chaplet of Divine Mercy.

Finally, as June winds down, please ensure your council completes the SP-7 Columbian Award form. Achieving four credits in each program area, including Faith, should be a fundamental goal. There are numerous straightforward yet meaningful ways to demonstrate our faith in action.

SACRED HEART OF JESUS ICON

As of this writing, the Icon should have reached 45 councils and well over 45 parishes in Wisconsin. Some common feedback that I have received from councils is a lack of prayer cards. Therefore, I'm asking all councils to order prayer cards before you get the Icon. The prayer cards are #11520 Sacred Heart Prayer Card and #613 Sacred Heart Litany Prayer Card. You can order them for free (but you pay for shipping). I advise combining orders with other items your council needs from Supreme, to keep shipping charges nominal.

The Home Enthronement of the Sacred Heart is now going forward with all the supplies available from Supreme. The following items can be ordered and are now in stock at Supreme: #11769 Enthronement Booklet, #11774 Enthronement Prayer Cards, #11762 Enthronement Certificates, #4361Image of the Sacred Heart 11X14 unframed, #PT-8 Framed Image of the Sacred Heart 11X14, and #11772 Sacred Heart Children's Activity Book.

As the Fraternal Year Comes to an end I need to collect the logbooks that are accompanying the Icon. I will have replacements for them to be given to the representatives of **Councils 2210**, **5456**, **596**, **1789**, **and 6560**, or their District Deputy with instructions on

returning the ones with the Icon to me. I have to get a report from these log books to Supreme by the end of July. On a final note of the Icon program the State received an updated schedule which should be posted on the web site. The biggest difference with the update had some spelling corrections and changes after November 2025. Remember If you have questions do not hesitate to call or email me on the Icon program.

SACRAMENTAL GIFTS

As I mentioned earlier there would be an addition to the Sacramental Gifts Program. Despite previous praise regarding our purchase of YouCat bibles for confirmation-aged students, there has been a steady decline in sales over the last three years. Sales declined by roughly 200 Bibles each year. This year I doubt we will hit 800 sales and continued making inquires to councils that stopped buying them, citing incompleteness as the main factor. This year at the convention we will have two Bibles available if your council is interested in purchasing them. I suggest you get a sample to consider with your Parish. Both bibles will still be available at the same price of \$12.50 each, which is less than half their normal cost. We also received a shipment of the YouCat Bibles in early April so if you need them please get your orders to me. They can be paid for either upon delivery or through the State Web site. If I get the order by convention we will have your bibles at Convention.

SILVER ROSE

The first draft of the Silver Rose Schedule has been delivered to the 27 host councils. As usual, changes will be made to the best our abilities. I ask that you consider the fact that out of over 300 councils, less than 10% of those councils can host the Silver Rose in any one year. While it is true that some councils have gotten it two years in a row, it is merely given their geographical location. Through conversations with the Illinois coordinator, we decided that going to Kenosha and Waukegan this year would be best. However, Kenosha surprised me by not requesting the Icon this year. Therefore, I'm looking yet for a council near lake Michigan to host Silver Rose on August 9th . Please reach out to me if interested.



EVERYONE IS STARTING TO GET excited about the upcoming Memorial Day holiday, making it the unofficial start of summer. As we get ready for this exciting time, it is important to remind ourselves of two things:(1) our programs continue throughout the summer, and (2) all programs are family events.
